- The essay must be properly formatted as per MLA 9th Edition. It must be double-spaced, in Times New Roman (or similar) font, size 12, with a 1-inch margin all around. Name of any individual faculty member must not be included in the essay.
- The file must be in PDF format (max size 10 MB).
- The assignments must be the original work of the students. They are strongly advised against plagiarism.
- Completely filled IA cover sheet must be included as the first page of the assignment.
- Handwritten essays will not be accepted.
- File name of each file should be same as the student's name followed by the paper code.
- Students must not contact any individual faculty member in any case.
